Activity Week - Week 8 Term 3, 2020

Employment Pathways students had an alternative activity week from Monday 7 September through to Friday 11 September 2020 in lieu of their camp week which was postponed due to Coronavirus.

Monday saw the girls enjoy a pamper morning while the boys had their reading levels tested. The middle session saw the boys go fishing and some of the girls had their reading levels assessed.

On Tuesday we went to Melville Island to visit Tiwi College where our female students played basketball with some of the Tiwi College students. It was a lot of fun. We then went down to the creek to have lunch and a dip in the water. We drove out to Purnali Beach. We had a laze under the bali hut, we shucked fresh oysters, chased crabs and danced on the beach. It was also Marlene's birthday, so a number of happy birthdays and cake were enjoyed by all.

Wednesday saw students go to Tarntipi Beach. Students went fishing and had a successful catch – lunch for the families. There was some relaxing and enjoying country. Students came back and had chicken and chips for lunch.

Thursday we had the Rangers come and speak to Employment Pathways and Stage 1 and 2 students. They were able to share with the students the different tasks they do in their roles and the possibilities of getting involved in this type of employment. We then visited Tiwi Enterprises, where Scott talked to the students about different job opportunities as well as work experience. We visited the motel, the garage, the Barge Shed and Tiwi Enterprises office. It was a very informative day.

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Science

Our three junior classes and EP combined to work on a Solar Oven project. We combined the classes so that the students could work in groups with their friends. They made solar ovens using cardboard boxes, black paper, aluminium foil, sticky tape and glue.

Solar ovens are useful when camping, cooking on fire ban days and if the people who need to cook food cannot afford to pay for electricity.

The students designed their own oven based on which material would reflect light and which material would absorb light. To test if they worked we put chocolate on top of cookies and watched the chocolate melt. Delicious!
