Dear parents, guardians and carers

Re: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the *Disability Discrimination Act* 1992 and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the *NCCD guidelines* (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- · category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. Special Sister Anne

Sister Anne Gardiner is a nun of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart who has lived in Wurrumiyanga for almost 70 years. Sister Anne is special to the Tiwi community because we can go to her for help and to talk to her when we are feeling down. She reminds us that things can be tough at times but you will get through it.

Sister Anne Gardiner was born on the 18th of June 1931. Sister Anne's family were farmers living around Gundagai in New South Wales. Her first school was the Mercy School of St Stanislaus. She then went to St Joseph's Boarding College in Albury to complete her education. Sister became a nun in 1949, more than 72 years ago. Sister Anne became a nun on Tiwi because she didn't know very much about Indigenous people at all. She described herself as enthusiastic, full of life and wanting to change the world, and on Bathurst Island, the people there changed her.

Sister Anne came to Tiwi in 1953 at the age of 22. She worked at the school as a Religious Education teacher. Sister Anne Gardiner taught the Tiwi people English and she also learnt how to speak the old Tiwi language and the culture. She has been with us for a very long time and she has seen lots of changes, from living in a convent and now to a brick and stable house. Sister Anne is a strong advocate of Tiwi culture and back then, supported bilingual education and the transition into Tiwi control of the school. She always looked after Tiwi people. My Grandmother told me that she was like a mother to her and her siblings, since her mum left for Darwin.

Sister Anne has received the Senior Australian of the Year Award in 2017 for her service and honouring the Tiwi people for a very long time. She thinks it is important for Tiwi people to keep their culture and language alive and not to forget their culture. The current generation can keep the culture going and can pass the culture on to the next Tiwi generation.

Damon, a student at Xavier College said, "I think Sister Anne is an important person because she has lived on the Tiwi Islands for many years and she helps the school by showing them good love and teaching younger kids about Jesus".

Debbie, a staff member at Xavier College, said, "Sister Anne is strong, intelligent and wise". She also said Sister Anne is "kind, spiritual and is always looking out for all of us on the Tiwi Islands".

Georgia, a teacher at Xavier College, said, "I think Sister Anne is very wise and I have a lot to learn from Sister Anne".

Sister Anne is important because she wants people to understand Indigenous cultures and she promotes bilingual education.

Sister Anne has plans to stay on Tiwi Islands for the rest of her life to continue teaching the Tiwi people. Sister Anne still has a sense of humour and when she comes into school, she says, "hi, I'm alive". Seeing Sister Anne around the community makes me happy because she's kind, helpful and wise in her own ways, and I thank her for being there for my family and always reminding me to believe in myself. She reminds me to never give up on school even though it is hard.



Awesome, Amazing Athletics Carnival at Xavier

Once a year we celebrate our athletic abilities by having a sports carnival with the primary school. The athletic carnival lets us compete against students from our own year level and show our teachers how hard we can do.

On day one of the carnival, we were focusing on the running and racing events. The main events of the day included the 100 metre race, the 300 metre race, the team flag relay race and the championship race.

The first day of the athletics carnival started with an Acknowledgement of Country, Mantiyupwi country. After that was the 300 metre race which got everyone's heart rate going much quicker. It was so long that some students could not finish it. The long race was broken up into year levels. Year 4 to 6 raced in one group, Year 7 to 9 raced in another, and Year 10 to 12 raced last in the senior group. Boys and girls raced in different groups. The winners of the long race from Year 7 to 9 were Campbell and Jeremena. The winners of the Year 10 to 12 were Dwayne and Gertrude.











After a much needed water break, we began the next event which was the 100 metre sprint. For the 100 metre race Xavier students raced in separate grades across the running track. The winners of the Year 7's were Tahni and Hubert. The winners of the Year 8's were Mia and

Jason. The winners of the Year 9's were Jeremena and Campbell. The winners of the senior race were Miriam and Dwayne. Before having a BBQ lunch, the house teams competed in a flag relay race and then everyone's favourite event, the championship races.

The championship race had all the fastest students in the school competing against each other. The champion boy for Xavier this year was Dwayne who won all his races earlier in the day. The champion girl for Xavier was Gertrude who actually fell over in her first race but was winning by so much before she tripped that teachers let her in the championship race. We finished the day with carnival activities where the younger students cooled down on the water slide, jumped on the bouncy castle and had a goal kicking

competition.







After a very big night's sleep students came back for day two at the carnival. With the running races were out of the way, students now had the chance to show how far they could throw and how high they could jump. It was during the high jump that students jumped so high that they almost jumped over a teacher's head.











HPE coordinator Josh Leane has helped run the last carnivals and mentioned that "watching all the students working together, laughing and enjoying each other's company made this one of the best carnivals in the last 10 years".

The athletics carnival was a very successful two day event. I felt very exhausted after the long race but I was happy.
