Dear Families,

We have lots to celebrate at Xavier at the moment! They are all settling in very well and are building strong relationships with students and staff. If you see them around town, please say Awana!

Our Family Report Night at the Club was a BIG success with over 40 people coming to talk about their children's progress at school. We did a family survey on the night to find out how our families think the school is going and we got lots of great ideas and feedback. Many families said that Xavier is very encouraging and they are happy with the subjects we are teaching, especially English, Maths, Smart Skills and Culture. They also love the role that Tiwi Teachers play at school. Many parents want help to teach their children to put their phones away and to manage what they are doing online. This is an area that we will focus on more at school in Pastoral Care lessons. It is a big problem for parents of teenagers everywhere, not just in Wurrumiyanga. Thanks to Leash Giles, Acting Curriculum Coordinator for organising this excellent night and our reporting process.

Bush Camp was a fantastic three days on country at Tarntipi. What was best about the camp was seeing everyone so happy, relaxed and peaceful. When I asked our students how they felt to be on country on camp, they called out STRONG, FREE, SAFE and RELAXED. We were blessed to have Mass celebrated at camp by Bishop Charles and Fr Francis. Thanks to the Strong Women (Jacinta, Regina and Frances) for teaching weaving, painting, and how to collect bush medicine. Thanks to the Orsto and Mungatopi Families for teaching music and yoyi to



everyone. Josh Leane led the camp team and he did a wonderful job.

It is six years since Pope Francis wrote his second letter, Laudato Si, which is about caring for our common home, this earth and all creation in it. Staff across our Catholic NT schools are doing work right now on the meaning of this document. We are very lucky in remote schools that we get to be on country so often. This helps us reflect on the sacredness and inter-connectedness of all creation. Tiwi people know instinctively that God is in everything and present in the everyday but we non-Tiwi often need reminding to slow down and to listen so that we can feel and see God. We thank God for the privilege of being on Tiwi land and in relationship with Tiwi people who draw us closer to our true selves and to God.

On Wednesday morning, the school headed down to a campsite by the Tarntipi waterhole. After a brief introduction to the rules of the camp, students were placed into groups for some fun activities that were aimed at improving teamwork and communication. By the looks on everyone's faces, fun was had by all.

In the afternoon, students experienced lessons in culture from some Tiwi elders and also had a quick swim in the waterhole. As evening came, students were introduced to many different riddles and also the game 'Spy' which was played well into the evening. As students went to bed, there was a very positive atmosphere around the campsite. It was very cold but everyone was able to brave it through the night.

On Thursday, students took part in culture lessons that included painting wooden squares that would later be combined as a whole school art project. The students had plenty of free time down at the beach where they were able to go for a long walk or fish in the mangroves. As it was quite hot throughout the day, the students had another chance to swim in the waterhole to cool off. In the afternoon students were placed into groups to complete a scavenger hunt. With lots of laughter and running around, this was a very popular time of the camp.

Students enjoyed a delicious bacon and egg sandwich breakfast before having one last swim. Sadly, it was time to leave and we all jumped into the school vehicles and headed back to community. Before they arrived home, all students helped wash vehicles, wipe down mats, air out sleeping bags, clean tents and other small jobs.

Xavier Bush Camp was a wonderful experience shared by the whole school community. The camp helped build relationships not only with students and teachers, but also between each other.

Red Dust Music Program

During the first week of Term 3 Students participated in a story-telling program as part of the Red Dust Project, through music as the main medium.

Students spent the week learning about the entire process of creating a song and music video. This first began with brainstorming the themes that students wanted to base the song on, which would eventually act as a guideline in creating song lyrics in both English and Tiwi language.



Students then learnt about beats, tempo and instrumental sounds that could be blended together to create the music to the song. The students decided to record the sound of clap sticks to be the foundation for the song.

Once the music and lyrics had been confirmed the students began thinking up locations around the community where they wanted to film their music video. With the support of the Red Dust team, as well as Leash, students put together their best foot forward in creating dance moves that would accompany the song and its lyrics.

The result of the student's creativity and their overall effort was a very special music video. Xavier's very own song and music video will be premiered online on 11 August. 
dent's efforts during this fun and exciting project.


