It is the busy end of term and I encourage all of us to maintain our focus, keep working together, stay positive and keep smiling, as we complete all of our schoolwork and other activities.



Kipwapi students have displayed strong learning in mathematics this term. Literacy Jarranga


In Literacy this term, Jarranga class have been looking at the book "Our World". This is based on the Bardi Jaawi people in the Indigenous community of Ardiyooloon.
