The Year 9 girls have been doing amazing work in History this term. We have learnt about when Captain Cook first came to Sydney parlingarri, in 1770. We've also learnt about the frontier wars that happened afterward, when Aboriginal warriors like Pemulwuy, Windradyne and Jandamarra fought back against the invading British. Aboriginal people are still fighting today, and we have learnt about the Aboriginal Tent Embassy and Freedom Ride protests. Well done, Year 9 girls!







STAGE 1 ENGLISH

This Semester students have been introduced to a number of different ways of writing including writing about an event in the past, writing a film review, instructional writing and writing about a song they like.

For the first topic in Term 1, they were asked to write about something that happened in the past. The second piece of writing was about responding to and writing about a film. Students learned how to write about characters, plot and setting and responded to a film that the class studied.

In Term 2, students worked on an assessment that asked them to do some instructional writing. They selected a topic that they had expert knowledge in and wrote under several subheadings. They also worked on song and poetry analysis. Students selected a song they liked, researched the song and singer, then annotated the song looking for meaning, song structure and elements of song-writing.



STAGE 2 SCHOOL BASED EDUCATION

This semester, five Year 12 students and five Tiwi Teachers have been working on units as part of the Certificate III School Based Education Course.

They have been learning about supporting students with additional needs as well as the legal requirements under Work Health and Safety, discrimination, and mandatory reporting amongst other laws. Year 12 students have commenced their work placements in the primary school for one day a week.

The course is 18 months - two years and counts as credit towards the Northern Territory Certificate of Education, for those students wanting to pursue a career in teaching and education, and will help current Tiwi Teachers better understand their roles and responsibilities in an educational setting.

During Culture this term students enjoyed lots of time on Country including two full days out to Tarntipi Beach to go hunting. These Hunting Days Out were enthusiastically attended by students and staff alike. Xavier students thrive when out warta (bush) and really showed off their hunting talents.

Other cultural learning this term included spending time with the wulimawi (old people) learning about ochre and jilamara (paint). We were also warmly welcomed to the Patakijiyali Museum where students engaged with the exhibits in order to answer questions. Of course we made plenty of time throughout the term to kawakawayi (sing) and yoyi (dance) together - it's a favourite thing to do amongst our students!
