Students at Xavier have had a fascinating term of science, looking into the interesting world of Tiwi culture and natural phenomena.

One of the highlights of the term was learning about hunting for yinkiti, particularly yilinga. Students learned about the unique characteristics of reptiles and even went out bush to search for these animals.

Following their study of yinkiti, students turned their attention to the solar system, the moon, and the changing seasons. They gained a deeper understanding of the planets in our solar system, the different phases of the moon, and the seasonal patterns that influence Tiwi people.

The students have been learning about how climate change affects Mother Earth and that the biggest impact is on the poorest of the poor. Y9G RE & ART

Year 9 RE & Art girls have had a very busy and productive time in Term 3. They have worked on a portrait of Sister Anne. They prepared for this by learning about Sister Anne's life on Bathurst Island since she arrived here in 1953. The best way to find out about this was to interview her about her life. They spent time working out questions and then when they were ready, they visited Sister Anne and recorded an interview with her. The Art project was to create a portrait in the style of New York Artist James Rizzi. The class spent time looking at his work and then drawing and painting in his style. Finally, they all made a portrait of Sister Anne with many of the things that she talked about in the interview forming part of the work.

The students also had an excursion to Ngaruwanajirri (The Keeping Place). They looked at the building and the beautiful mural work on its ceiling then met the painters and the wood carvers. After this they made a pendant by sanding and painting thin pieces of Iron Wood with traditional Tiwi designs.











As part of their work on looking after the land, they painted landscapes on rocks collected from Tarntipi Beach, then they painted landscapes on discarded and crushed cans found on the side of the road. The junk art was threaded onto a piece of driftwood, also collected from Tarntipi beach, showing that junk can be recycled into something of artistic value.





Y9G LITERACY & NUMERACY

Term 3 has been busy for the Year 9 girls. In Numeracy, we started learning about money maths. This helps to teach the students the best way to use money in real life situations and sets them up for more financial success in the future. The students learned about adding and subtracting money, budgeting, saving and money management. We have finished the term investigating different forms of measurement. We learned about measuring time, weight and distance.





In Literacy, we have continued improving our reading skills by learning new vocabulary in stories. The girls have also built up their spelling bank and are close to completing their full spelling booklets. One of our main focuses this term was our class novel, Holes. We read the book, summarised the story and reinforced our knowledge of the characters and setting with the use of ICT. We also researched different countries and made projects about the animals, language, clothes, food and landmarks in these countries. The Year 9 girls have been focused and dedicated to improving their English and maths knowledge all term!

The Year 8 & 9 boys have made great progress in HPE this term. In Physical Education the boys played modified Indigenous games such as Boogalah and Chuboochuboo. They also improved their hand eye coordination through their participation in net games.

In Health we have focused on emotions. Videos of 'Black As' acted as a tool to engage the students in each lesson. We looked at situations which may cause stress in life and how you have to adapt using skills of resilience, teamwork, persistence and gratitude. Keep up the good work leading into Term 4.




