In Literacy students are reading Roald Dahl's beloved novel *Matilda* and reading about all the pranks she pulls on her father. Students are strengthening their understanding of syntax, practicing sentence structures, and expanding their vocabulary by learning new words from the book.

Year 9 students visited Jilamara Arts Centre on Melville Island in the first week of Term 4.

At Jilamara they were shown the museum and many of the girls recognised art done by



members of their families. They made ochre by grating ochre rocks then cooked some yellow ochre over the fire to make red ochre. The girls were introduced to the artists working there on the day and then they painted Tiwi designs using the ochre they had prepared, on bark prepared by Arthurina Moreen - star of the recently released film, Like My Brother, and now working in Arts Administration at Jilamara.







STAGE 1 ENGLISH

Year 10 and 11 English students have had a busy few weeks completing English assessments. The final assessment was to analyse a short story about the Stolen Generation and the resilience of Indigenous people. They learned about characters, setting and dialogue and the difference between telling and showing. Over the year English students have studied different sorts of text and different ways to analyse and write about topics ranging from films to emails. Students were all happy to finish a great year's work in English.



STAGE 2 CERT III SCHOOL BASED EDUCATION

This semester students commenced three units of work around student health, safety and wellbeing in an educational setting. They learnt about the types of issues that students experience with their health and safety and how this can affect their learning at school.

Students also developed skills and knowledge around the relevant state and territory laws and procedures such as work, health and safety, mandatory reporting, and risk management.

Year 12 s continued with their work placements at the primary school which formed part of their assessments. Some staff completing the course started a unit in Term 4 about organising personal work priorities. Staff currently enrolled hope to continue the course in 2025 to complete the remaining units.

Altogether there are 15 units that make up the Certificate III School based Education and takes approximately 2 years to complete. The course is designed for people wishing to have a career as a Assistant Teacher Student Support Worker Language Teacher. The course will continue in 2025 with a new intake of Year 12 students and staff.



SERENITY SPACE Shakira

The Serenity Space is open to all students for the first hour of each school day. This space is used to help students get themselves 'ready-to-learn' and to help develop their self regulation techniques. Students use 'check-in' boards and other mood identifying tools to help them name how they are feeling and then choose activities that will support them to get ready for a day at school. Activities can include playing with tactile therapy tools, completing jigsaw puzzles, solving brain teaser challenges, listening to calm down or pick me up music. Sometimes the Serenity Space is somewhere you can simply find some peace and quiet and just have a yarn with a friend or teacher. Students have contributed positively to this program and are finding themselves better able to describe their emotional needs and identify behaviours that can best support them with their learning.



VET LITERACY Don

The VET students have made a very positive start to Term 4. In Literacy we studied the movie, *Holes*. We examined the main characters in the story and explored different vocabulary and descriptive language to portray them. We also learned how to construct a letter.

With the arrival of rapper Lil Eazy-E, we covered the topic of questioning. We looked at different types of questions and created a list for the rapper. Based on Lil Eazy E's visit and message, we started to write our own stories and build rap songs based on this.

In addition to this, the students have been learning about why things float or sink. Density, mass and volume was explored through building a raft at Tarntipi waterhole. We have been building our understanding and knowledge of density through running experiments and writing our predicted outcomes and description of the outcome. A greater understanding of mass and volume was shown through student written responses and reflection of the raft experiment.





PASTORAL CARE

We are investigating the journeys of celebrated Tiwi Island players like Michael Long, the Rioli's and others that have made a legendary impact in the AFL. Through engaging activities and mentorship from Essendon players, students will consider the values of leadership, resilience, and community impact that define a strong legacy.

We look forward to seeing the inspiration that will spark from this collaboration and the personal growth it will inspire in our students.
